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Rosa's Thanksgiving Dinner set to feed hundreds this Friday

'Mother Wims' hosts 32nd annual event at the Montgomery Center

ROCHESTER – Thanksgiving is like Christmas for Rosa Wims.

It's the happiest time of year for the 94-year-old Rochesterian, who will host "Rosa's Thanksgiving Dinner" for the 32nd year this Friday at the Montgomery Neighborhood Center on Cady Street. The meal traditionally welcomes hundreds of her neighbors from Corn Hill and the surrounding communities.

"Every bit of 300," Wims said when asked how many mouths she expects to feed this year. "If more come, we'll always have a pea in the pot for 'em."

"Mother Wims" has dedicated her life to public service. She is recognized as the first black nurse's aide at Rochester General Hospital and later became a licensed practical nurse. She founded the Faith Community Health Awareness Center on Genesee Street, which later was renamed in her honor, the Rosa Wims Family Wellness Center.

What began as a small holiday gathering on Jefferson Avenue has transformed into a yearly tradition that feeds hundreds. Volunteers from the health care community help serve the food, much of which is prepared by Foodlink's Community Kitchen. The turkeys are generously donated by Palmer Food Services. Although Rosa is still front and center at the event, always welcoming attendees with a warm smile, she has ceded some the organization of the event in recent years to her close friends and to Foodlink's staff.

This year's event begins at noon and lasts "until the food runs out."
